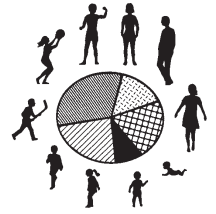

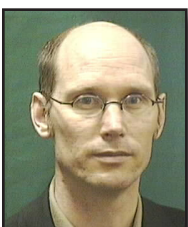

Workshop #1

Using the Revised Versions of the Conflict Tactics Scales:

The CTS2 (Partner-to-Partner) and the CTSPC (Parent-to-Child)

Sherry L. Hamby, Department of Psychology, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, Co-Author of CTS2 & CTSPC

The Conflict Tactics Scales (CTS) have been widely used for 30 years to assess partner violence and child abuse in both research and clinical settings. The most up-to-date versions, the Revised Conflict Tactics Scales for couples (CTS2; Straus, Hamby, Boney-McCoy, & Sugarman, 1996) and the Parent-Child version (CTSPC; Straus, Hamby, Finkelhor, Moore, & Runyan, 1998), include scales for Psychological Aggression and Physical Assault. The CTS2 also includes scales for Negotiation, Injury, and Sexual Coercion. The CTSPC includes scales for Nonviolent Discipline, Neglect, and Weekly Discipline. All versions of the CTS can be adapted for different modes of administration (e.g., questionnaire, interview), referent period (last year, last month, since the program began, etc), respondent (partner, parent, child), and type of measure (last-year-prevalence, ever-prevalence and chronicity). The workshop will provide an understanding of (1) the differences and similarities between the original CTS and the two revised versions, (2) the many options that are available in administering and scoring the CTS, and (3) the applicability of the CTS to different populations and cultural groups. The workshop will cover all aspects of the CTS, including limitations and criticisms of the CTS so that prospective users can evaluate whether it is appropriate for their purpose.

Workshop #2

Stats They Didn't Teach You in Graduate School: Lessons From The Last Decade of Applied Statistics

Theodore Cross, Crimes against Children Research Center & Brandeis University

Many researchers never had a good stat course or last took one years ago. This workshop provides a user-friendly introduction to useful statistical tools and concepts developed or disseminated in the past decade. It will be taught at a beginning to intermediate level. Topics will include: *I think Best in Pictures*: Some of the best of the new tools involve using pictures to portray statistical difference or relationships. *Does this difference make a difference?* Statistics for many years neglected to look carefully at how big and meaningful statistical results really are. This section looks at effect size and what has clinical, not just statistical significance. *How many subjects do I need?* Often researchers have to decide how many subjects they need for a study (Or needed!), but good tools for this have only recently become available. These tools allow you to come up with good estimates to within a subject or two. *How significant is the significance test?* The .05 level of significance has achieved god-like status, but recent work questions the meaning and value of significant tests. We will examine the critique and explore alternatives.

Workshop #3

Using Hierarchical Linear Models (HLM) with Longitudinal & Dyadic Data

Aline Sayer, University of Massachusetts at Amherst

The hierarchical linear mode provides a conceptual framework and a flexible set of analytic tools to study a variety of social and developmental processes. One major application focuses on the modeling of longitudinal data, or the study of individual change over time. A second application concerns the analysis of dyads, where the problem of inter-dependency in the partner scores is taken into account by the model.

This workshop will provide an introduction to HLMs for these 2 applications using the HLM6 computer program (Raudenbush, Bryk, and Congdon, 2004). The emphasis is on data analysis and interpretation of results. This workshop is interactive, but participants need to provide their own laptops with HLM6 pre-loaded onto the computer. Workshop #4

Publishing Your Article (or Book): Practical Suggestions Concerning Research, Clinical Interventions, or Prevention Programs

Many researchers and clinicians approach writing with fear and apprehension. Yet a vital part of our work is to disseminate and share our findings, approaches, or programs in a scientific manner. In this workshop, you will learn how to be a more effective and confident writer. You will learn how to make your articles more readable, consider the needs of your audience, meet publisher requirements, deal with editors, overcome writers' block, and learn to increase the odds of getting your article published in a reputable journal. You will also learn about each section of a research or clinical article: what should be there, and what can safely be left out.

We will discuss how to submit an article to a journal, deal with reviewers' comments, and revise your work. Please bring specific questions, sample articles, reviewer or editor letters, or a prospectus to discuss or review. The workshop presenters edit and oversee major journals in the field of family violence and child maltreatment, and one also is editor-in-chief of an entire book and journal program involving trauma and maltreatment for an international publisher.
