WI Course Statements:

These are text boxes: some text inside the box may be selected and pasted into a syllabus as an excerpt or the perimeter can be selected and the entire framed unit pasted into a document (and then resized, edited, etc).

Description One:

This is a **writing-intensive** course that partially fulfills the university's undergraduate writing requirement, which states that all undergraduates must complete First Year Writing (EN401) plus three "writing intensive" courses, at least one of which will be in the major, and at least one of which will be 600-level or above.

Writing intensive courses share the following goals for student writing and learning: a) Students should use writing as an intellectual process to learn material, to discover, construct, and order meaning; b) students should learn to write effectively in various academic and disciplinary genres for professional and lay audiences; c) and students should learn to display competence with the generic features and conventions of academic language.

Description Two:

This is a **writing-intensive** course which partially fulfills the university writing requirement (see http://www.unh.edu/writing/uwr/). The threefold goal of writing-intensive courses is for students: 1) to use writing as a means for learning course material; 2) to learn various academic and disciplinary genres, and; 3) to gain competence with academic and other writing by focusing on the craft and process of writing.

Description Three:

This course is designated **writing-intensive** (WI), and therefore emphasizes the role of writing not only to produce a formal product but also as an intellectual process to help students discover, construct, and order meaning, and to learn material.

To satisfy the University Writing Requirement you must take **four** WI-designated courses: in addition to EN401, one must be in your major and one at the 600 level or above. Description Four:

This is a designated **writing-intensive** course, which in part satisfies the University Writing Requirement (see http://www.unh.edu/writing/uwr/). WI courses meet three guidelines: 1) the writing is substantial and integral to the course; writing accounts for at least 50 percent of the grade; 2) the course employs feedback and process; writing is done in stages, allowing for meaningful feedback and revision; 3) the course employs informal or low stakes writing; writing has a role outside of graded events (write-to-learn).
