NH SUPPORTS EMINENT DOMAIN AMENDMENT

Durham, NH – New Hampshire voters are backing Issue 1, a Constitutional Amendment that restricts the use of eminent domain for the taking of property. Issue 2, which would change how State House Districts are drawn, does not have the 2/3 support it needs to pass.

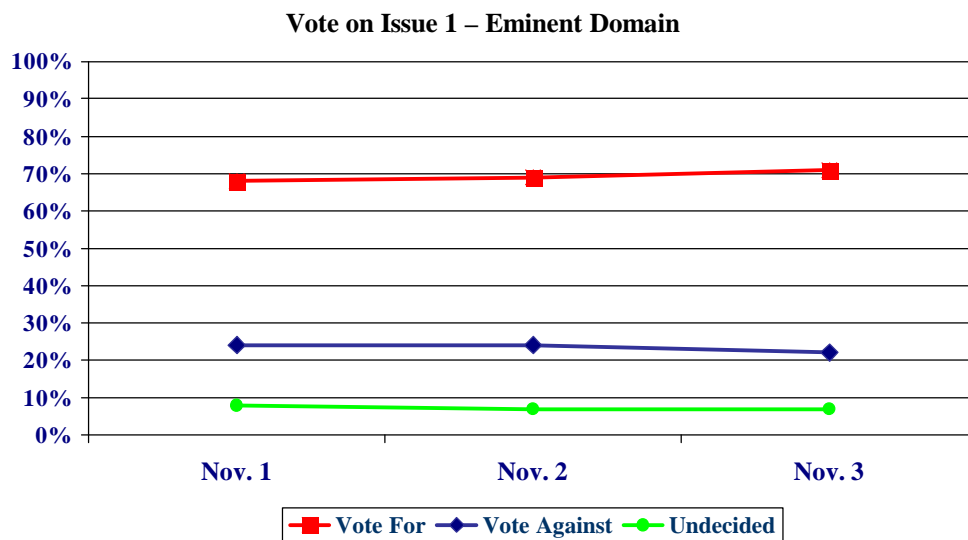
These findings are based on the 2006 WMUR / UNH New Hampshire Tracking Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. This survey is sponsored by WMUR-TV Manchester and the University of New Hampshire.* Six hundred forty-one (641) likely New Hampshire voters were interviewed between October 30 and November 2, 2006. The potential sampling error for the statewide survey is $\pm 3.9\%$. Three-hundred thirty-six likely 1st District voters were surveyed (margin of sampling error of $\pm 5.3\%$) and 305 likely 2nd District voters were interviewed (margin of sampling error $\pm 5.6\%$). Issue 1: Eminent Domain

In the wake of the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in *Kelo v. New London*, there has been renewed interest in how governments use their power of eminent domain – their power to take land from private owners for various uses. What made the *Kelo* decision so controversial is that the City of New London Connecticut used its power of eminent domain to take someone's house so that a private developer could use the land rather than for public use such as a road, park, or government building. The New Hampshire Legislature responded to public pressure after *Kelo* and passed an amendment to the New Hampshire Constitution which would ban the use of eminent domain for private use. This amendment, known as Issue 1, is on the New Hampshire ballot for ratification by voters in New Hampshire. It must be approved by two-thirds of voters for it to become law.

In the latest WMUR / UNH NH Tracking Poll, 71% of likely voters say they will vote for Issue 1, 22% say they will vote against Issue 1, and 7% are undecided.

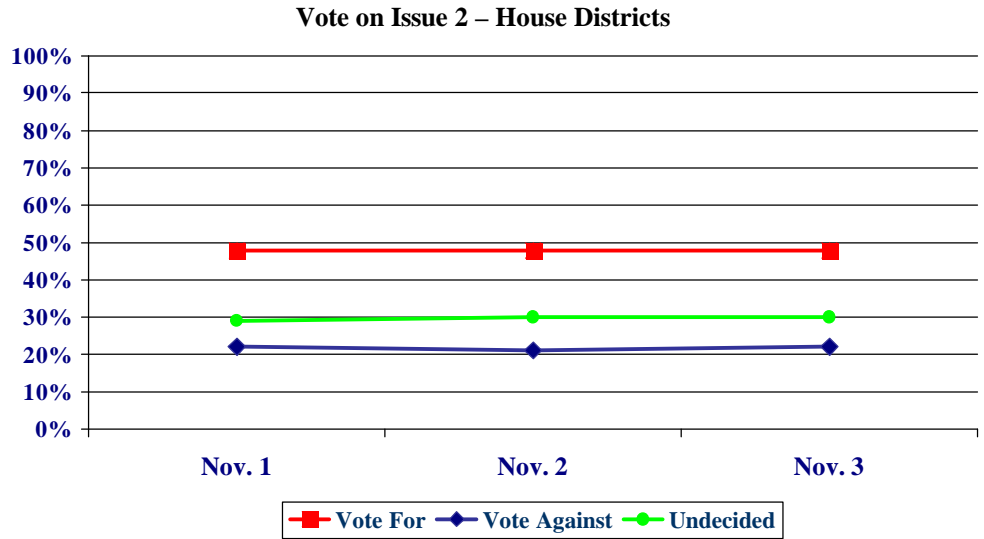
Issue 1 has broad support across the electorate with Republicans, voters with post graduate educations, and voters living in Northern New Hampshire being most likely to vote for Issue 1.

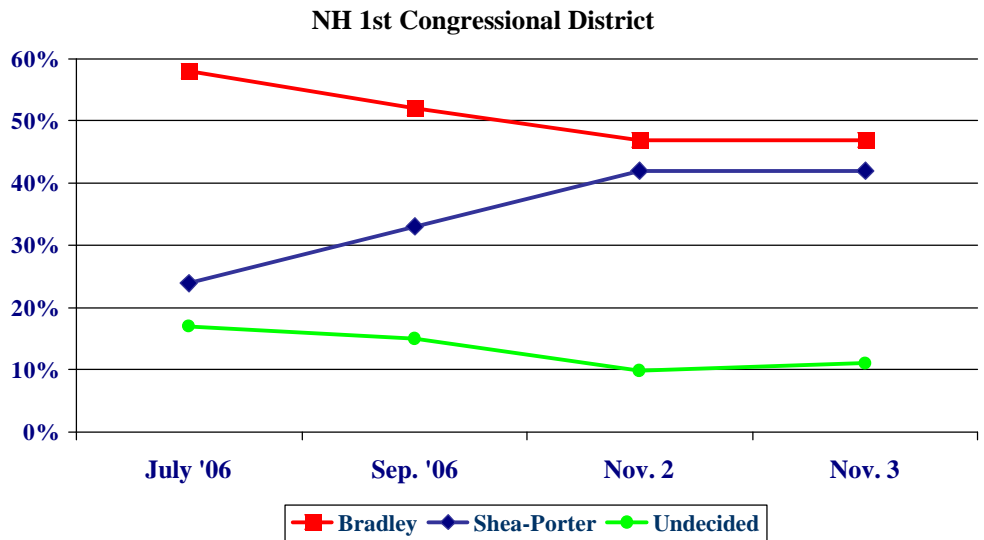
Issue 2: House Districts

Another Constitutional Amendment on the November ballot deals with how New Hampshire State House districts are draw. If Issue 2 passes, smaller towns with about 3200 people, would be able to have their own district for the New Hampshire House instead of the multi-member districts we see today. Currently, 48% of likely voters say they will vote for Issue 2, 22% will vote against, and 30% are undecided. The way this Issue is worded on the ballot makes it very difficult for voters to understand what it will do and the high percentage of undecided voters reflects this confusion.



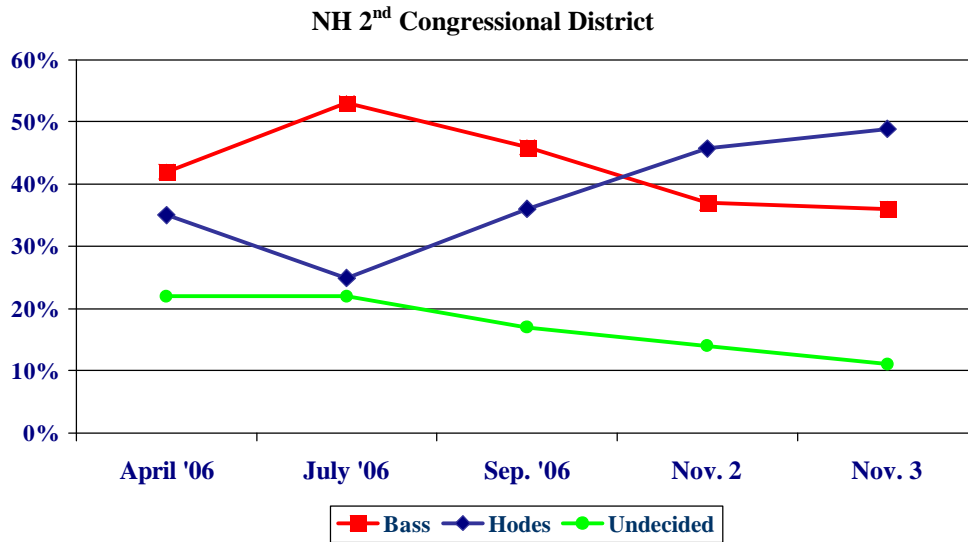
NH First District

In the race for New Hampshire’s 1st Congressional District, Republican incumbent Jeb Bradley continues to hold a narrow lead over Democrat Carol Shea-Porter. In the latest WMUR / UNH Tracking Poll, 47% of likely 1st District voters say they will vote for Bradley, 42% favor Shea-Porter, and 11% remain undecided.



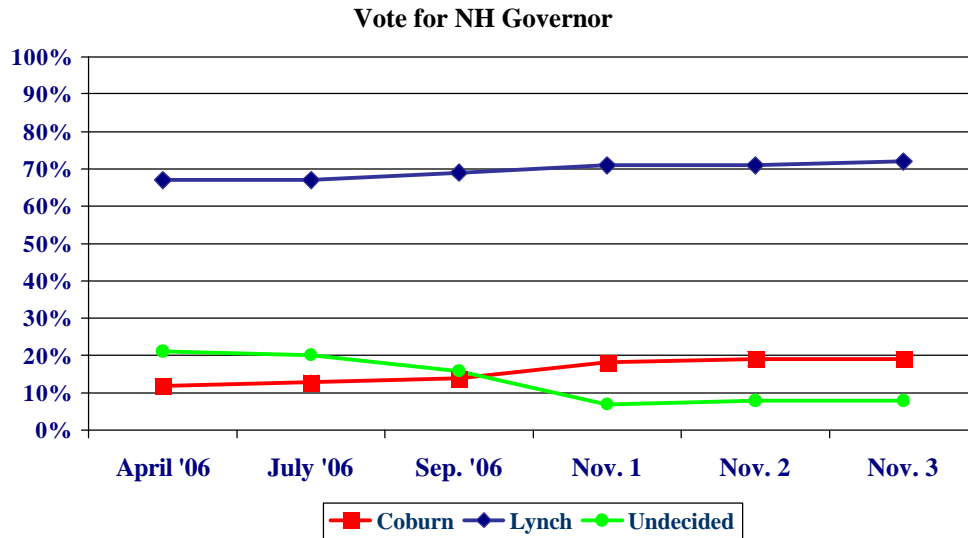
NH Second District

In the 2nd District, Democratic challenger Paul Hodes has expanded his lead over incumbent Republican Charlie Bass. In the latest WMUR / UNH Tracking Poll, 49% of likely voters in the 2nd District say they will vote for Hodes, only 36% say they will vote for Bass, 3% prefer Libertarian Ken Blevins, 1% prefer some other candidate, and 11% are undecided. In yesterday's tracking poll, Hodes led Bass 45% to 37%.



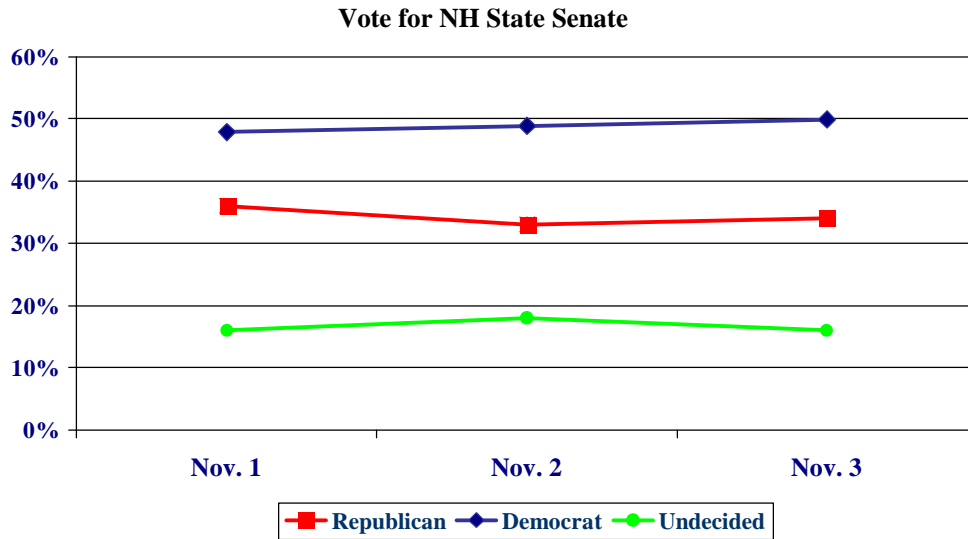
NH Governor

Incumbent John Lynch continues to maintain a wide lead over Republican Jim Coburn in the race for New Hampshire Governor. The latest tracking poll has Lynch at 72% , Coburn with 19%, 1% prefer some other candidate and 8% are undecided.



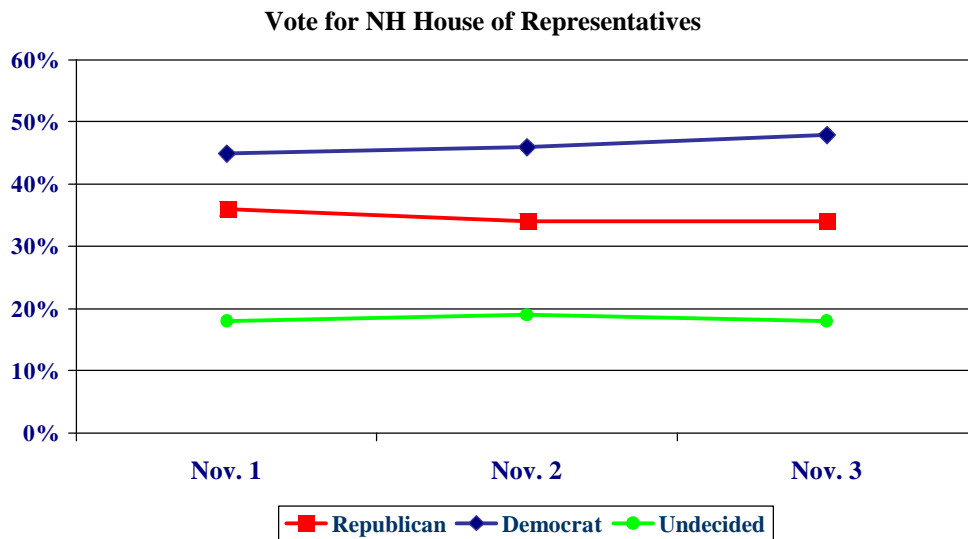
NH Senate

Democrats continue to lead in generic ballots for the New Hampshire Senate. In the latest track, 50% of likely voters say they plan to vote for the Democrat in their State Senate district, 34% plan to vote for the Republican, and 16% are undecided.



NH House

Democrats also lead in generic ballots for the New Hampshire House. In the latest track, 48% of likely voters say they plan to vote for the Democrat in their State House district, 34% plan to vote for the Republican, and 18% are undecided.
