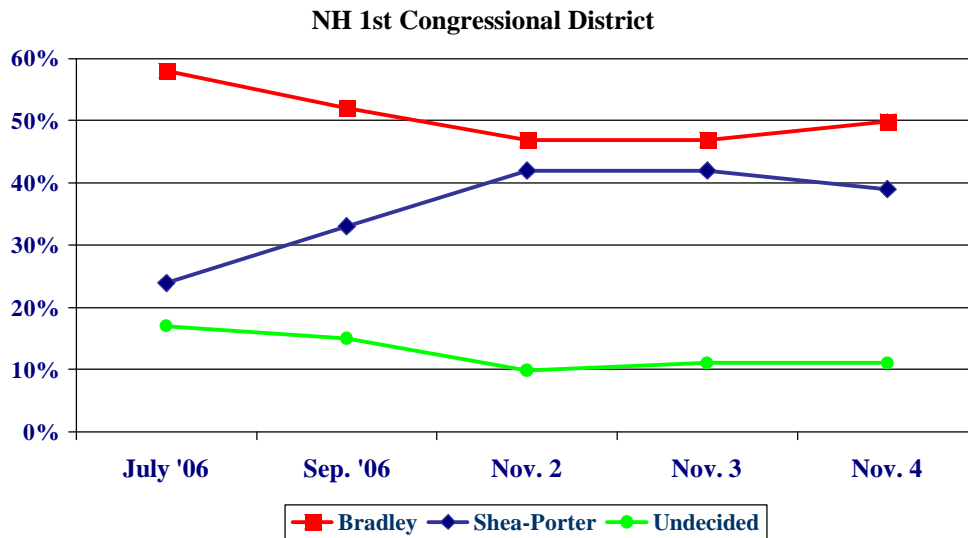
BRADLEY WIDENS LEAD IN NH 1, HODES MAINTAINS LEAD IN NH 2

Durham, NH – Incumbent Republican Jeb Bradley has expanded his lead over Democratic challenger Carol Shea-Porter in New Hampshire’s 1st Congressional District. In the 2nd District, challenger Paul Hodes continues to lead incumbent Republican Charlie Bass, although his lead has narrowed slightly.

These findings are based on the 2006 WMUR / UNH New Hampshire Tracking Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. This survey is sponsored by WMUR-TV Manchester and the University of New Hampshire.* Six hundred four (604) likely New Hampshire voters were interviewed between October 31 and November 3, 2006. The potential sampling error for the statewide survey is $\pm 4.0\%$. Three-hundred twenty-one likely 1st District voters were surveyed (margin of sampling error of $\pm 5.5\%$) and 283 likely 2nd District voters were interviewed (margin of sampling error $\pm 5.8\%$). NH First District

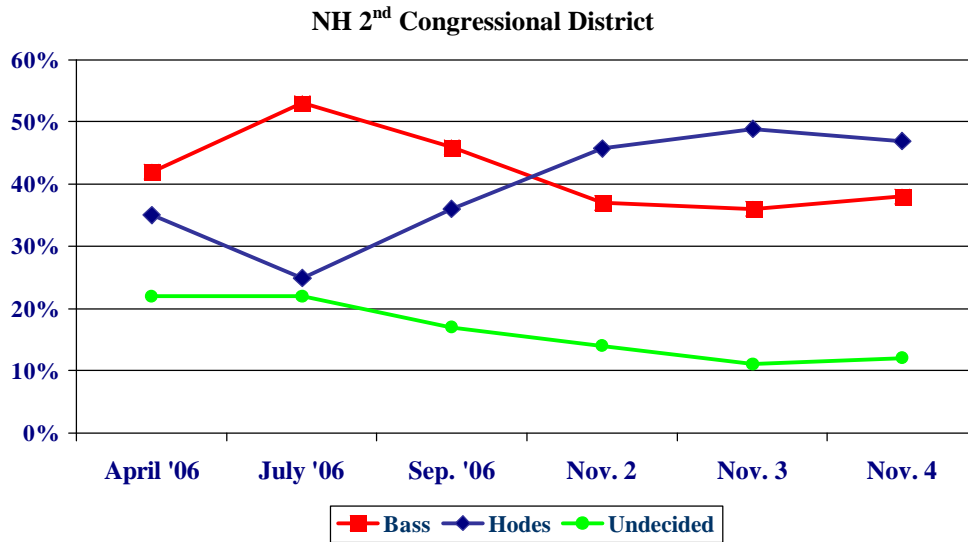
In the race for New Hampshire’s 1st Congressional District, Republican incumbent Jeb Bradley has increased his lead over Democrat Carol Shea-Porter. In the latest WMUR / UNH Tracking Poll, 50% of likely 1st District voters say they will vote for Bradley, 39% favor Shea-Porter, and 11% remain undecided. Bradley holds a 59% to 34% lead among men while women are evenly split. Shea-Porter leads 59% to 39% among voters who are extremely interested in the election.

NH Second District

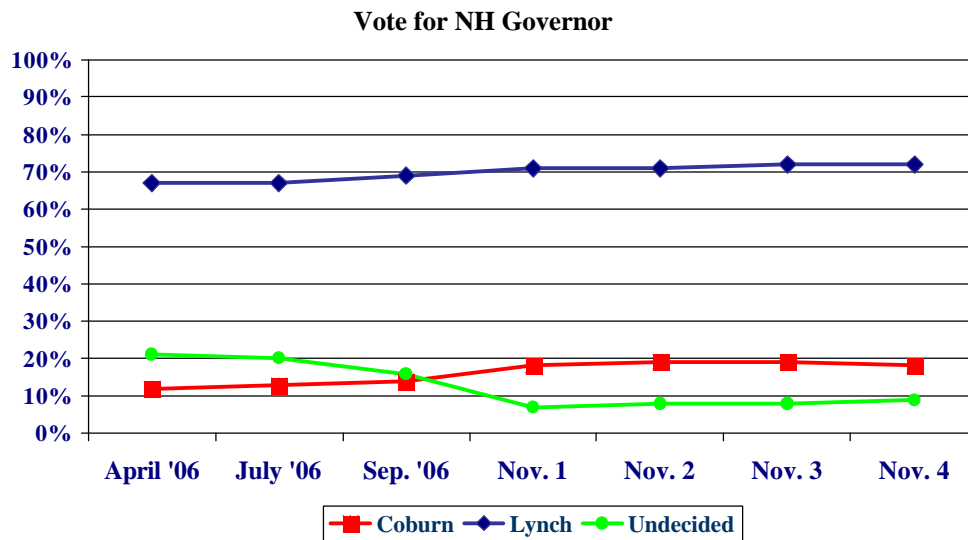
In the 2nd District, Democratic challenger Paul Hodes' lead over incumbent Republican Charlie Bass has narrowed somewhat. In the latest WMUR / UNH Tracking Poll, 47% of likely voters in the 2nd District say they will vote for Hodes, 38% say they will vote for Bass, 2% prefer Libertarian Ken Blevins, and 12% are undecided. In yesterday's tracking poll, Hodes led Bass 49% to 36%. Hodes is doing well in part because he 16% of Republicans say they will vote for him while only 11% of Democrats say they will vote for Bass.



NH Governor

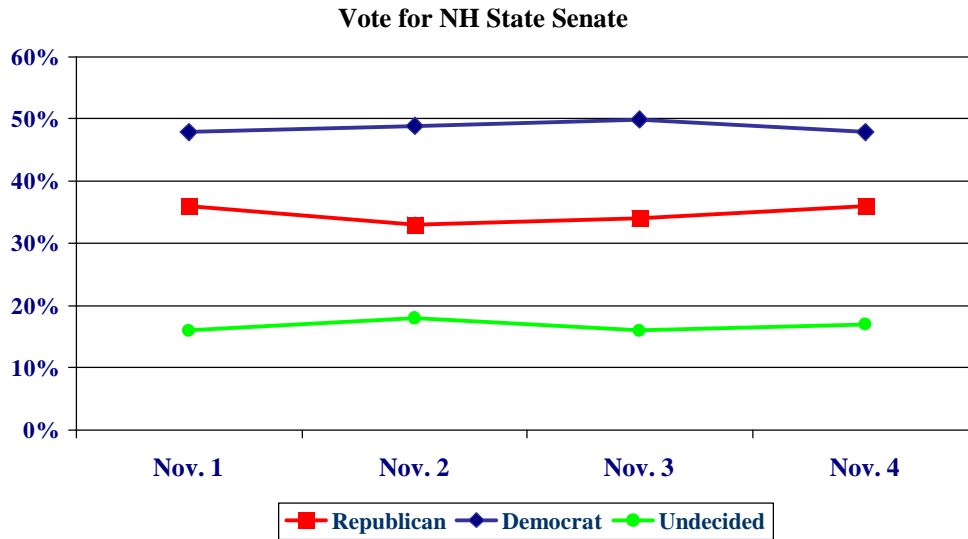
Incumbent John Lynch continues to hold an insurmountable lead over Republican Jim Coburn in the race for New Hampshire Governor. The latest tracking poll has Lynch at 72%, Coburn with 18%, 1% prefer some other candidate and 9% are undecided.

An issue that has not affected this race as much as some had expected is how to fund public education. A series of New Hampshire Supreme Court decisions, known as "Claremont", have said the State is responsible for funding education which has led to an unpopular statewide property tax. Jim Coburn and other legislators have proposed a constitutional amendment that would reverse the Claremont decisions and return the responsibility for funding education to towns and cities. This amendment did not pass the legislature and is not popular among New Hampshire voters. Only 30% of likely voters say they favor for this amendment, 39% oppose, and 31% are undecided.



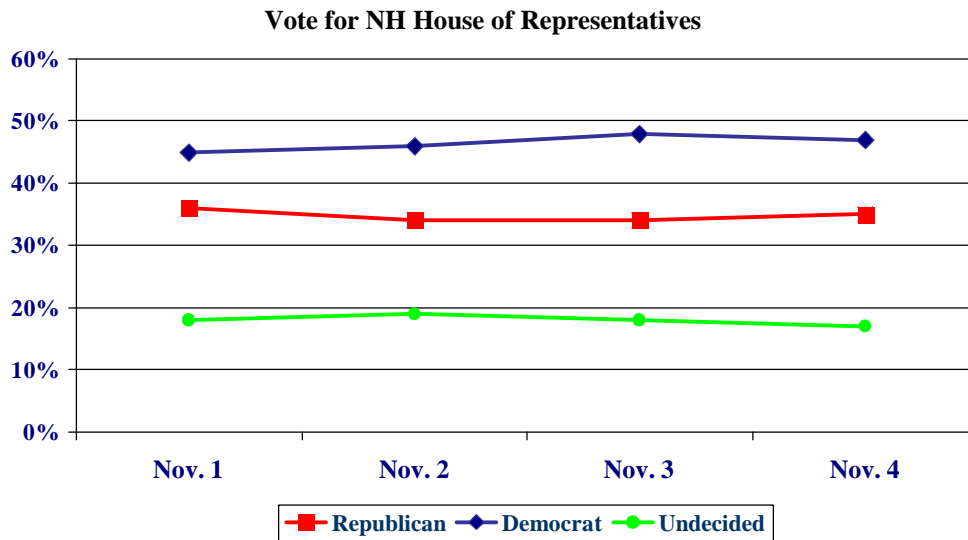
NH Senate

Democrats continue to lead in generic ballots for the New Hampshire Senate. In the latest track, 48% of likely voters say they plan to vote for the Democrat in their State Senate district, 36% plan to vote for the Republican, and 17% are undecided.



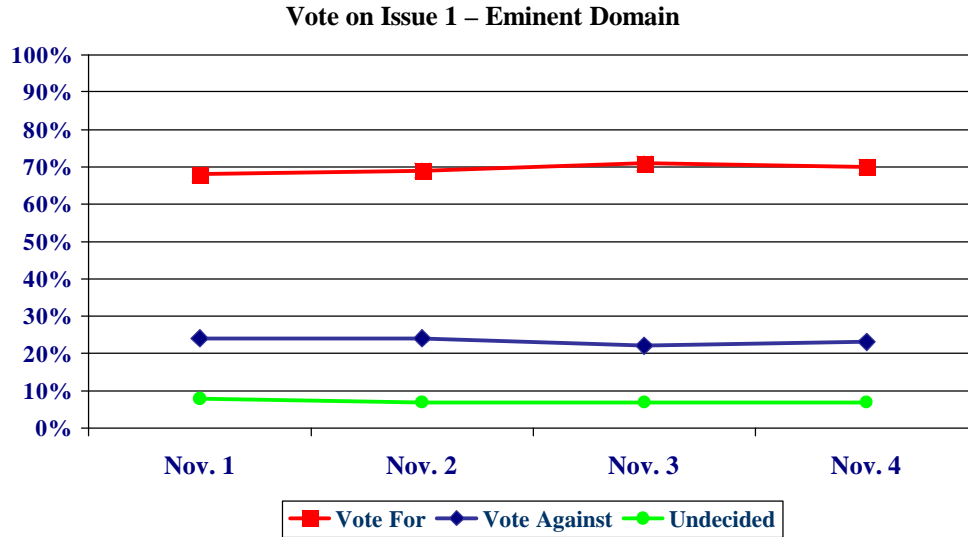
NH House

Democrats also lead in generic ballots for the New Hampshire House. In the latest track, 47% of likely voters say they plan to vote for the Democrat in their State House district, 35% plan to vote for the Republican, and 17% are undecided.



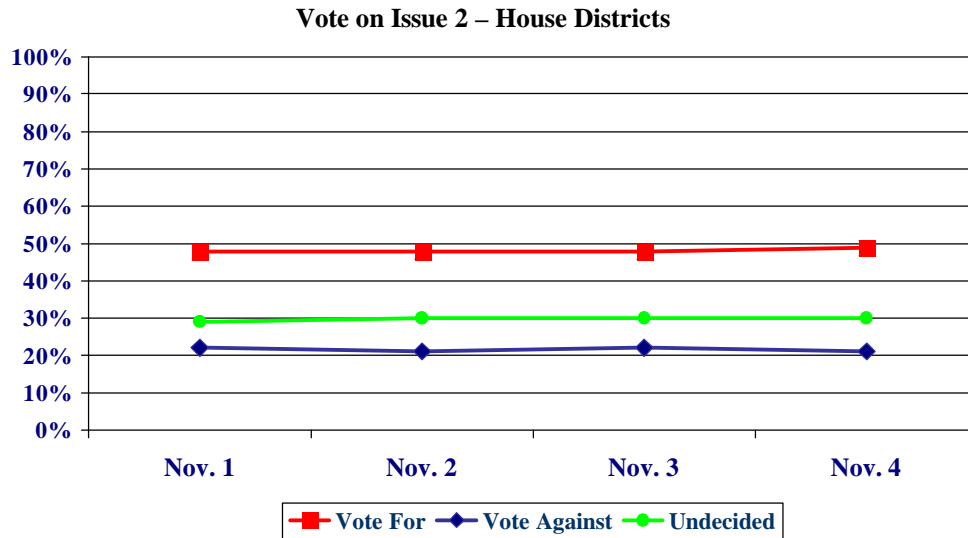
Issue 1: Eminent Domain

Issue 1, which would limit government use of eminent domain, continues to be supported by more than the necessary two-thirds of voters required for it to pass. In the latest WMUR / UNH NH Tracking Poll, 70% of likely voters say they will vote for Issue 1, 23% say they will vote against Issue 1, and 7% are undecided.



Issue 2: House Districts

Issue 2, which would change the way NH State House districts are drawn, remains below the two-thirds mark. Currently, 49% of likely voters say they will vote for Issue 2, 21% will vote against, and 30% are undecided.
