UPSET LIKELY IN NH 2, BRADLEY TO HOLD NH 1

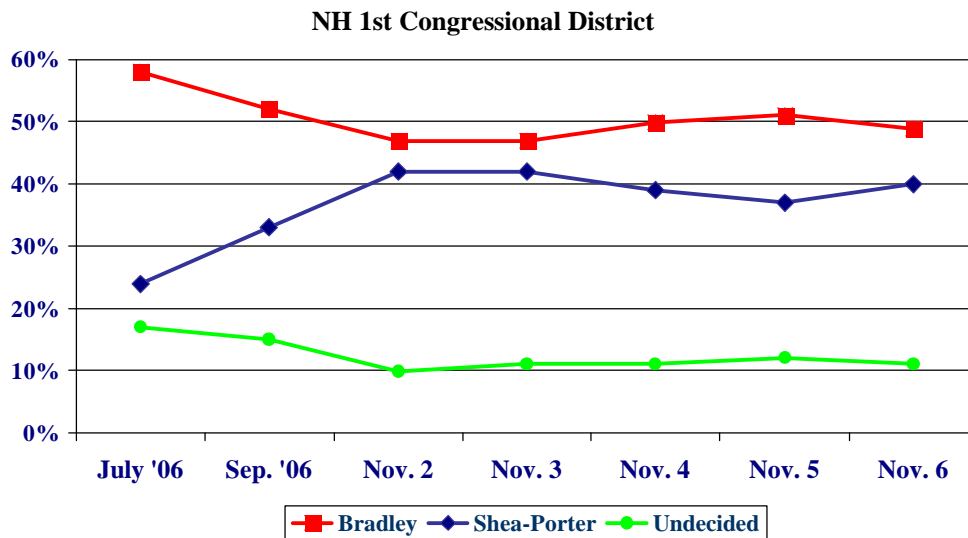
Durham, NH – Democratic challenger Paul Hodes is positioned to upset incumbent Charlie Bass in New Hampshire's 2nd Congressional District. Incumbent Republican Jeb Bradley holds a narrow lead over Democratic challenger Carol Shea-Porter in New Hampshire's 1st Congressional District. Incumbent Democrat John Lynch could win a record percentage of the vote for a candidate for New Hampshire governor.

These findings are based on the 2006 WMUR / UNH New Hampshire Tracking Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. This survey is sponsored by WMUR-TV Manchester and the University of New Hampshire.* Six hundred fifty-one (651) likely New Hampshire voters were interviewed between November 2 and November 5, 2006. The potential sampling error for the statewide survey is $\pm 3.8\%$. Three-hundred thirty-nine (339) likely 1st District voters were surveyed (margin of sampling error of $\pm 5.3\%$) and 312 likely 2nd District voters were interviewed (margin of sampling error $\pm 5.5\%$). NH First District

In the race for New Hampshire's 1st Congressional District, Republican incumbent Jeb Bradley's lead over Democratic challenger Carol Shea-Porter has tightened. In the latest WMUR / UNH Tracking Poll, 49% of likely 1st District voters say they will vote for Bradley, 40% will vote for Shea-Porter, and 11% remain undecided.

When undecided voters are allocated to the candidate they will most likely vote for, the final prediction is 53% for Bradley and 47% for Shea-Porter.

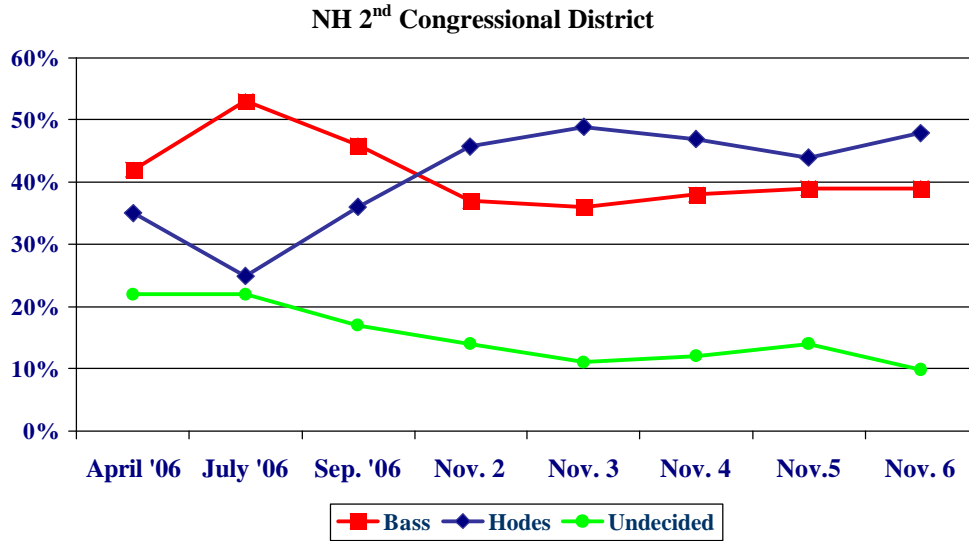

NH Second District

In the 2nd District, Democratic challenger Paul Hodes appears to have reversed incumbent Republican Charlie Bass's late charge. In the latest WMUR / UNH Tracking Poll, 48% of likely voters in the 2nd District say they will vote for Hodes, 39% say they will vote for Bass, 3% prefer Libertarian Ken Blevens, and 10% remain undecided.

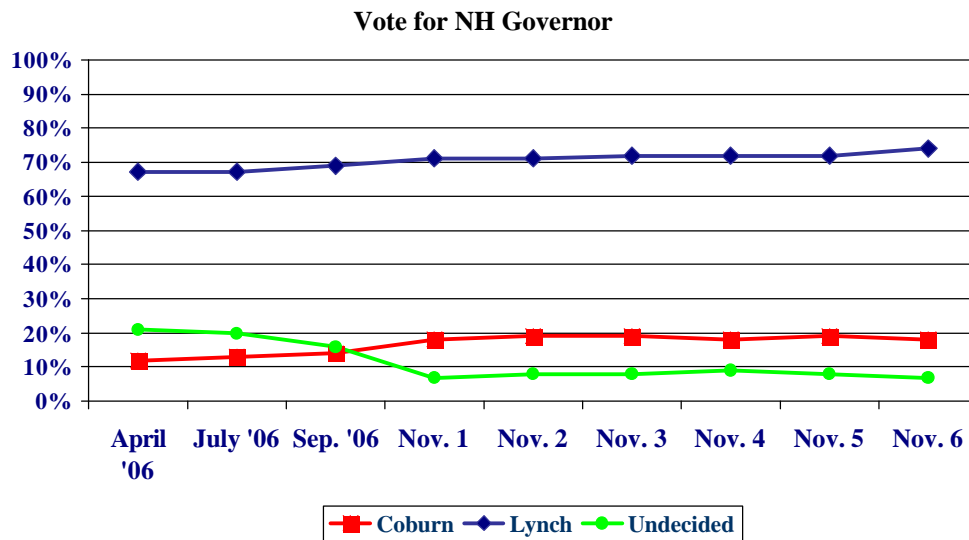
When undecided voters are allocated to the candidate they will most likely vote for, the final prediction is 54% for Hodes, 43% for Bass, and 3% for Blevens.



NH Governor

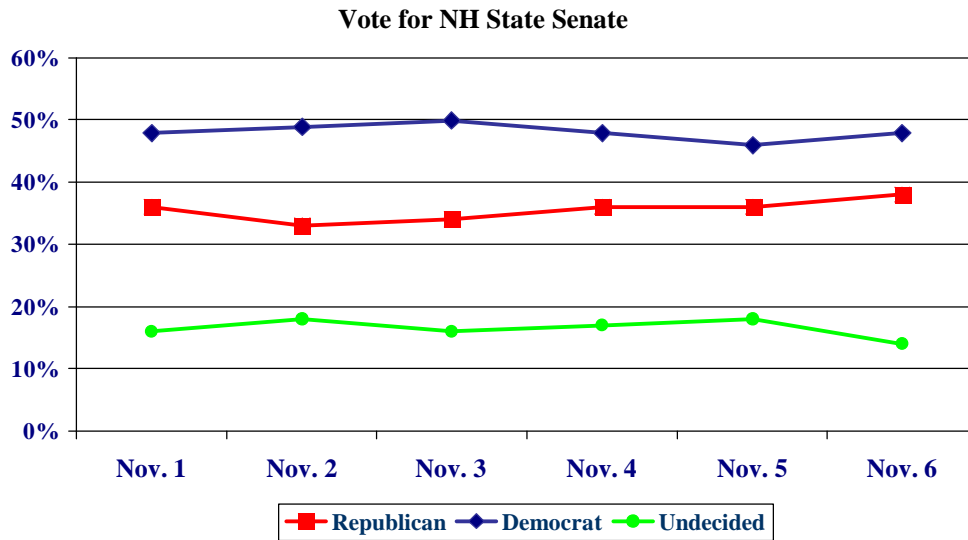
Incumbent John Lynch continues to hold an insurmountable lead over Republican Jim Coburn in the race for New Hampshire Governor. The latest tracking poll has Lynch at 74%, Coburn with 18%, 1% prefer some other candidate and 7% undecided.

When undecided voters are allocated to the candidate they will most likely vote for, the final prediction is 77% for Lynch, 22% for Coburn, and 1% for some other candidate. Should Lynch get 77% it will be a record for a candidate for a New Hampshire governor.



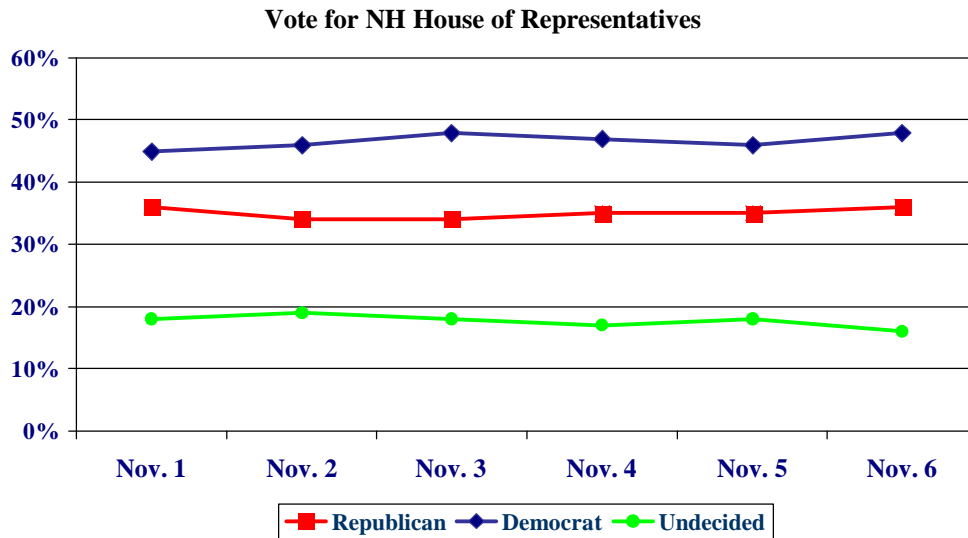
NH Senate

Democrats continue to lead in generic ballots for the New Hampshire Senate. In the latest track, 48% of likely voters say they plan to vote for the Democrat in their State Senate district, 38% plan to vote for the Republican, and 14% are undecided. This points to a split Senate or even a Democratic majority.



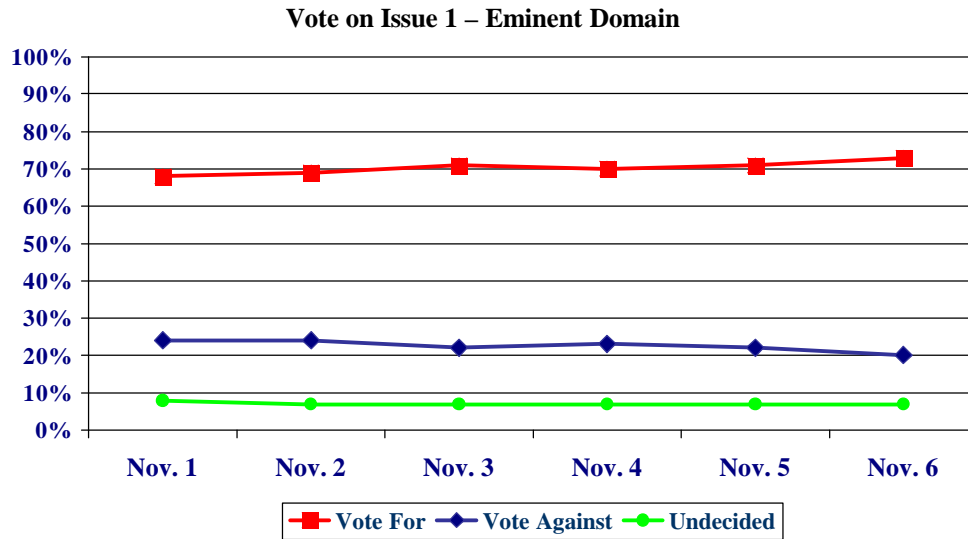
NH House

Democrats also lead in generic ballots for the New Hampshire House. In the latest track, 48% of likely voters say they plan to vote for the Democrat in their State House district, 36% plan to vote for the Republican, and 16% are undecided. Democrats are poised to make large gains in the State House and could reach parity with Republicans.



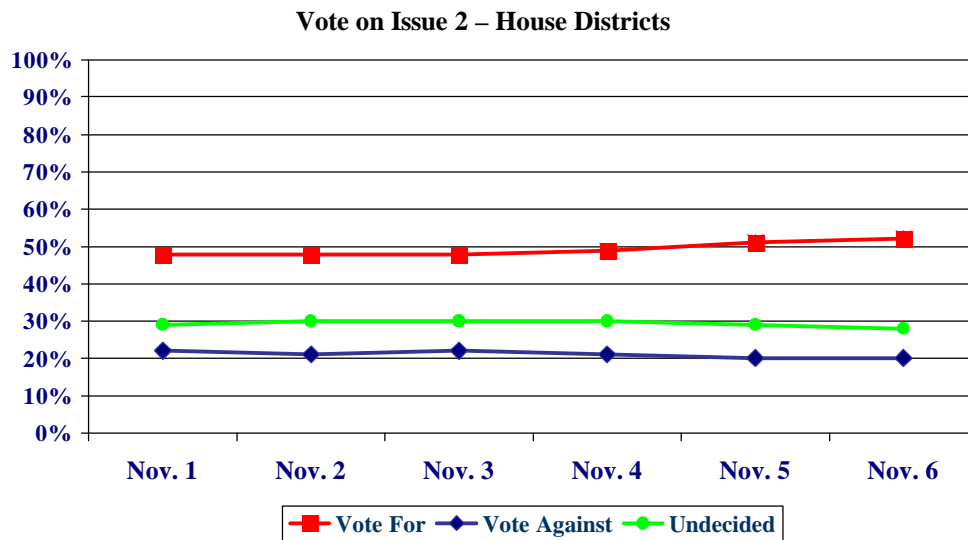
Issue 1: Eminent Domain

Issue 1, which would limit government use of eminent domain, continues to be supported by more than the necessary two-thirds of voters required for it to pass. In the latest WMUR / UNH NH Tracking Poll, 73% of likely voters say they will vote for Issue 1, 20% say they will vote against Issue 1, and 7% are undecided.



Issue 2: House Districts

Issue 2, which would change the way NH State House districts are drawn, remains well below the two-thirds mark. Currently, 52% of likely voters say they will vote for Issue 2, 20% will vote against, and 28% are undecided. Because of the difficulty in understanding the ballot language of this issue, as reflected by the high percentage of voters who are undecided, it is not likely to pass.

Impact of Iraq on Congressional Vote

"How important is the war in Iraq to your vote for U.S. Congress ... very important ... somewhat important ... not very important ... or not important at all?"
