ECONOMY TOP NH CONCERN, LYNCH REMAINS POPULAR

DURHAM, NH – The state of New Hampshire’s economy continues to be seen as the most important problem facing the state. Concern about gas prices has also risen. Despite these economic concerns, Governor John Lynch still has high job approval.

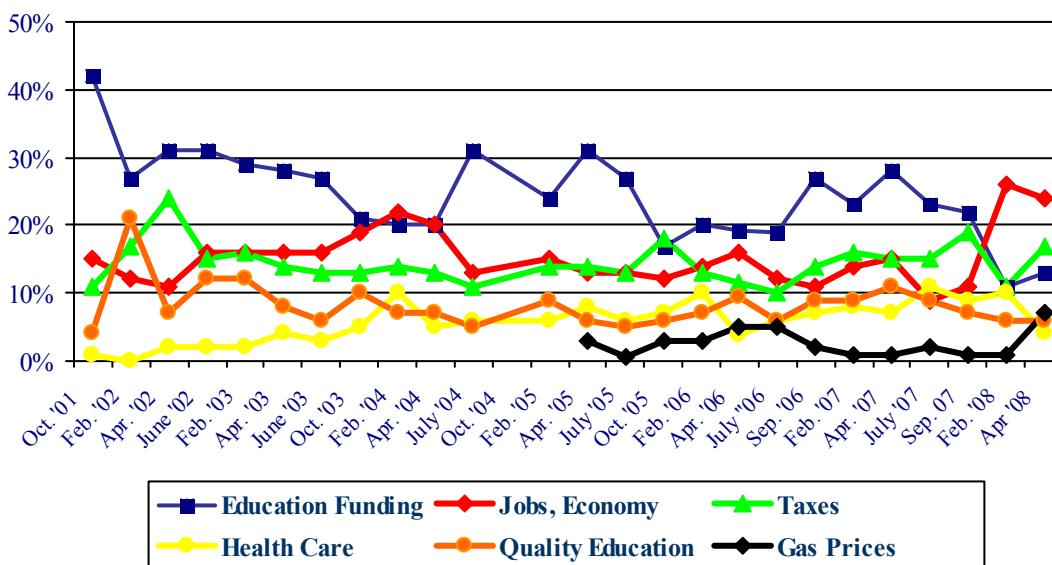
These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll**,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred (500) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by telephone between April 25 and April 30, 2008. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-4.4 percent. Included was a subsample of 456 likely November voters (margin of sampling error, +/- 4.6%).

Most Important Problem Facing New Hampshire

As news about the US economy continues to be gloomy, New Hampshire residents see the economy and jobs as their biggest concern for the state. In the latest Granite State Poll, 24% of New Hampshire adults said that jobs and the economy are the most important problem facing the state, followed by high taxes and desires to change the tax system (17%), how to fund primary and secondary education (13%), the cost of gasoline (7%), the quality of education (6%), health care issues (4%), and concerns about the state budget (4%).

Until recently, New Hampshire residents have said the most important problem facing the state is how to deal with the NH Supreme Court’s “Claremont” decisions dealing with funding education in the state but economic concerns and rising gas prices are more immediate problems to many people in New Hampshire. “Any time the economy sours, people become much more concerned about their own economic well being than about other issues,” said Andrew Smith, Director of the UNH Survey Center which conducts the Granite State Poll. “Couple with rising gasoline prices, folks are more concerned with making their household budgets balance than they are with state budget problems.”

Most Important Problem Facing NH

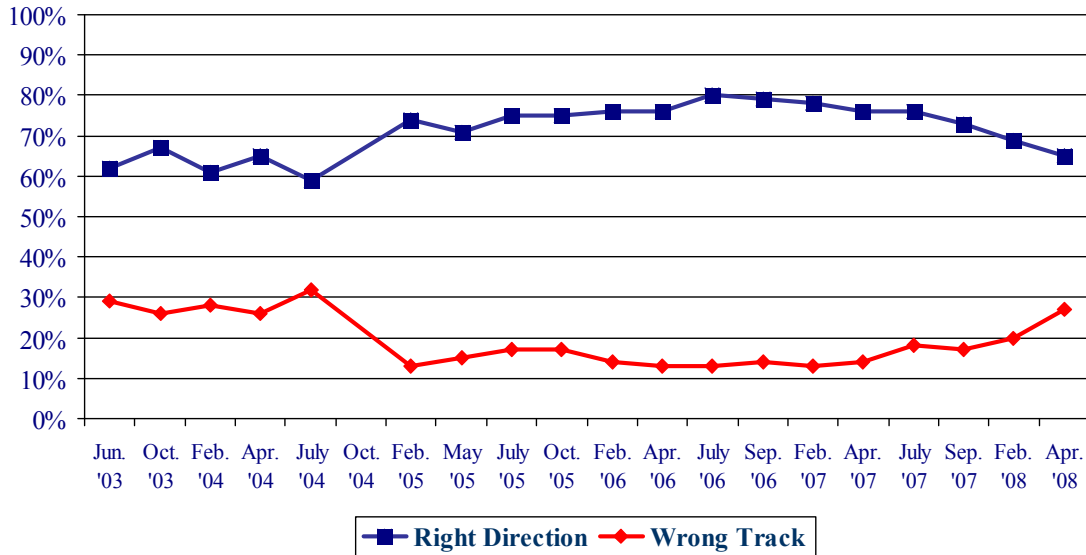

Right Direction or Wrong Track?

Despite the economic news, Granite Staters remain optimistic about the future of New Hampshire. Sixty-five percent think things in New Hampshire are generally going in the right direction, 27% think things are seriously off on the wrong track, and 8% say they don't know. The percentage who think things in New Hampshire are headed in the wrong direction has increased somewhat as the economy has faltered.

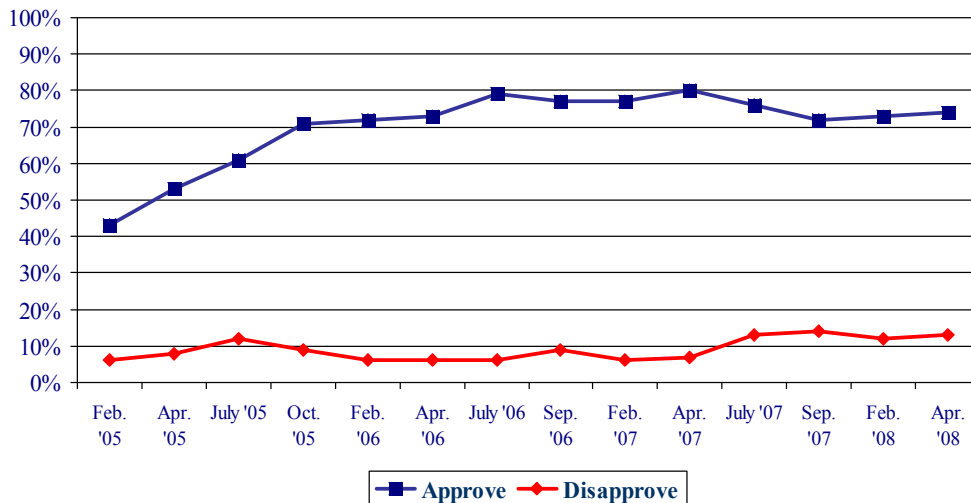
NH Heading in Right Direction or On Wrong Track?



Gubernatorial Approval

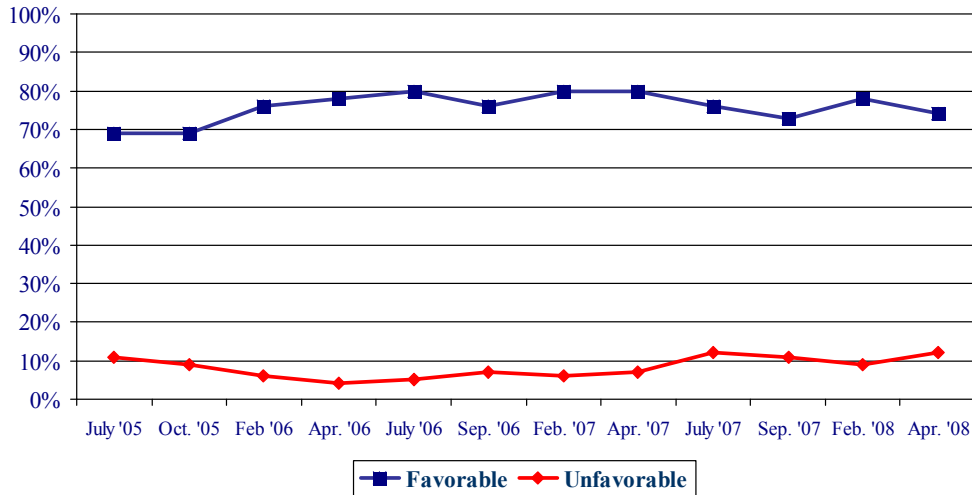
John Lynch's approval ratings as New Hampshire Governor continue to be high during as he approaches reelection in November -- 74% of New Hampshire adults say they approve of the job Lynch has done as governor, only 13% disapprove, and 13% are neutral. Seventy percent of both Republicans and 70% of independents approve of the job Lynch is doing as governor making his chances for reelection look quite good.

Lynch's personal favorability rating also remains high. In the latest Granite State Poll, 74% of New Hampshire residents say they have a favorable opinion of Lynch, only 12% have an unfavorable opinion, 11% are neutral, and 4% say they don't know enough about him to say. Lynch's net favorability rating, the percentage having a favorable opinion minus the percentage having an unfavorable opinion, is an incredibly high +62 percent.

Favorability Ratings – NH Governor John Lynch

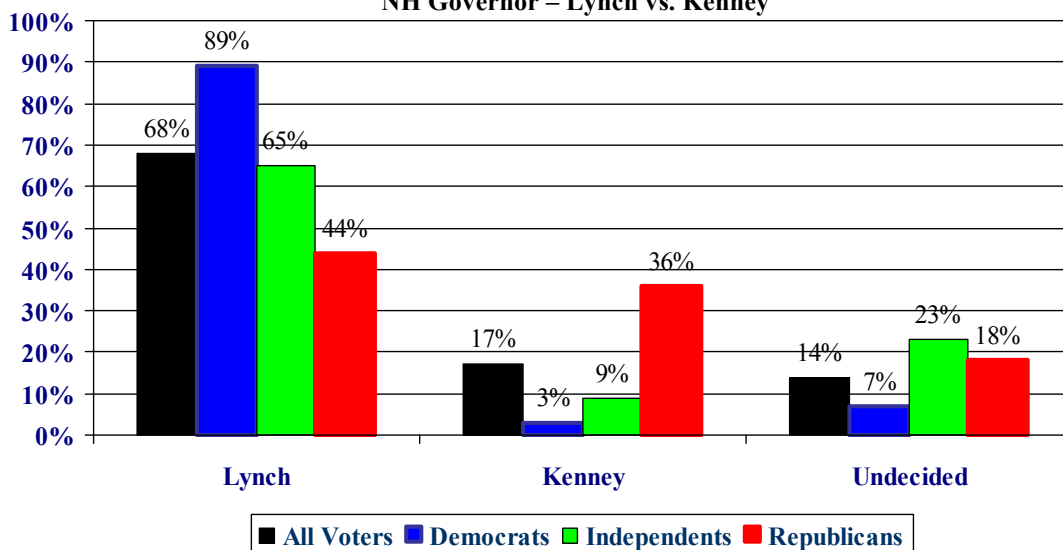


2008 Gubernatorial Election

A major implication of Lynch's high approval rating is that few Republicans want to challenge him for the corner office. Recently, former Republican gubernatorial candidate Bruce Keough and Manchester Mayor Frank Guinta have decided not to run for Governor. The one Republican who has remained in the fray is State Senator Joe Kenney of Wakefield. Kenney faces a difficult task taking on Lynch and begins at a distinct disadvantage because he is largely unknown to New Hampshire. Only 12% of New Hampshire adults say they have a favorable opinion of Kenney, 7% have an unfavorable opinion of him, 17% are neutral, and 65% don't know enough about him to say.

In a matchup between Lynch and Kenney, Lynch holds a commanding lead among likely voters. Two thirds (68%) of likely voters say they would vote for Lynch, 17% say they would vote for Kenney, 1% prefer some other candidate and 14% are undecided. Lynch leads Kenney among all groups of voters, including Republicans and conservatives.

Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll** conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred (500) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by telephone between April 25 and April 30, 2008. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-4.4 percent. Included was a subsample of 456 likely November voters (margin of sampling error, +/- 4.6%).

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.
