I am a philosophy professor at the University of New Hampshire. Previously a lawyer at a major New York law firm and a judicial clerk for the United States Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit, I teach and write on issues in law, politics, and society. I published *I Was Wrong: The Meanings of Apologies* in 2008 and *Justice through Apologies: Remorse, Reform, and Punishment* in 2014 (both with Cambridge University Press). I am the co-founder and director of the Future Leaders Institute, UNH's residential pre-college summer camp in philosophy, politics, ethics, and global justice. As of 2024, I am also the founding director of the UNH Center for Ethics.
