


PLACES & SPACES

- The Mathematics Assistance Center relocated to The Business in Practice Program purchased **Kingsbury Hall**, allowing all engineering students to work with each other and faculty members.
- The Child Study and Development Center **created a new sensory nook** to benefit young children and UNH student interns learning about self-regulation and sensory play/integration.
- The Hodgdon Herbarium digitized 8,000+ documents making it more accessible and relevant • The Dean of the UNH Library launched Project to people across the state.
- **new equipment** that provides a better remote classroom experience for students engaging with instructors across the country.
- Several **athletic teams upgraded video** equipment, invested in scouting software and purchased specialized equipment and gear to enhance student-athlete success.

RESEARCH & PROJECTS

- UNH Extension's Coastal Research Volunteers purchased kits for their rockweed program that monitors brown algae along the NH coast and minnow traps and fish nets for salt marsh monitoring.
- 40+ students participated in the new Graduate Research Retreat, an all-day program focused on teaching the complex processes around **conducting research** and the importance of mental health.

- The School of Marine Science and Ocean Engineering provided funding to **purchase specialized** equipment and cover vessel operating costs for five student research projects.
- The Office of Community, Equity and Diversity funded a research project that examined inclusionary beliefs and behaviors related to **LGBTQ+ students** involved in collegiate athletics and university recreation. And, Paul College funded a project to improve gender diversity in the fields of data science and marketing analytics resulting in the creation of more inclusive curricular materials.

STUDENT SCHOLARSHIPS

- New scholarships were established in memory of beloved faculty members including the William Wetzel Scholarship to support the next generation of Angel Investors at Paul College, the Professor Marcus B. Hurn Scholarship to support law school students, and the Ann Kelly Great Nurse Scholarship to promote the characteristics emblematic of highly regarded nurses.
- The Sustainability Institute launched the Equity in Experience Scholarship, allowing more students to take advantage of their Changemaker Collaborative's high-quality internships and fellowships.



■ Diverse learning communities were financially **supported** through the Staff Sergeant Ryan M. Pitts '13 Scholarship which aids military veterans at UNH Manchester and Shoals Marine Lab Scholarships which were awarded to 22 students of under-represented backgrounds, life experiences. and viewpoints to attend summer courses on Appledore island.

STUDENT EXPERIENCES

- Several student groups **hit the road**. Examples include the Model UN team attending their national conference in NYC and winning a Distinguished Delegation Award; the Cybersecurity Club attending the Northeast Collegiate Cyber Defense Competition in VT and placing 4th; and the five student entrepreneurs winning the grand prize at e-Fest, the largest national undergraduate business plan competition.
- 50 Honors Program students participated in meet-ups at locations like Odiorne Point State Park, the MFA in Boston and the International Cryptozoology Museum in Portland to stay engaged throughout the summer months.

- Students had enriching cultural experiences
- while studying abroad. For example, while in Italy, they visited the Concentration Camp at Fossoli, the Biennale in Venice, and attended a live opera at the Arena di Verona.
- Northeast Passage engaged 61 students entering the Adaptive Sports and Recreation Therapy fields by providing valuable hands-on experiences working with disabled individuals participating in their programs and clinical services.
