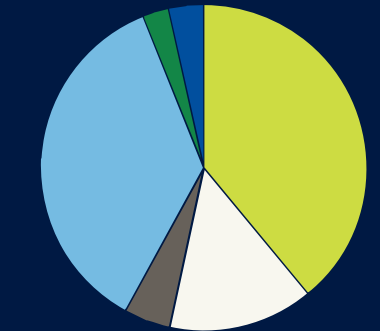

The new Honors Outdoor Orientation Trips (HOOT) program welcomed **30 honors students** for three days of outdoor activities.

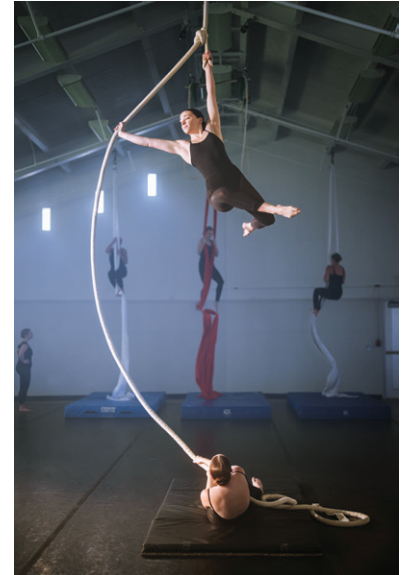
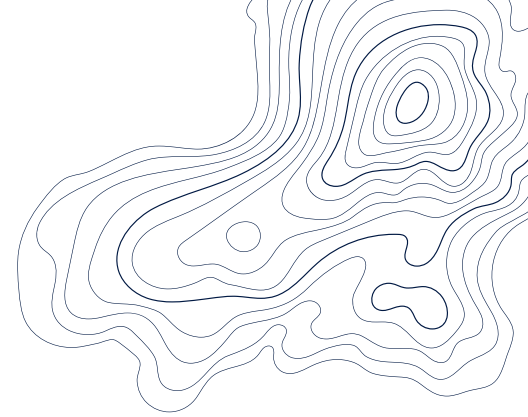


Over 150 graduate students received funding for research, professional development, and travel.



Real world, real impact

Hands-on **opportunities to learn and work in real-world settings are the hallmark of a UNH education**, and donors open so many of these doors. CHHS students researched injury prevention and mental wellness in the Brain & Experience Lab. COLSA students studied how oyster larvae can help protect the Great Bay ecosystem. CEPS students interned at NASA and the historic Mount Washington Cog Railway. Paul College students landed roles at Amazon, Goldman Sachs, and L.L. Bean, while entrepreneurs honed start-up ideas at the ECenter.





Helping Wildcats thrive

Donor generosity **elevates and enriches the UNH student experience**. Gifts help ease burdens and have the power to truly change Wildcats' lives. They provided 542 students with basic needs resources, expanded peer tutoring in COLSA, funded travel for student-athletes, and made global study opportunities through COLA possible. Donor support also helps foster a community of belonging by nurturing UNH's more than 200 student programs and organizations.

On campus and in the community

Donor support impacts every corner of UNH's three campuses and reaches across the Granite State. It funded digitized archives at UNH Franklin Pierce School of Law and summer training for men's and women's basketball student-athletes. It provided COLA with a new woodshop jointer to foster student creativity and craftsmanship and allowed CEPS to upgrade its liquid nitrogen tank. Even Dimond Library's "huddle spaces" received new technology to enhance collaboration. Donors also shaped future Wildcats by sending 70 youth to Barry Conservation 4-H Camp, building confidence and connection through outdoor adventure.
